Activities for the Classroom

Here are several ideas for activities on diversity for your classroom. Do one or do them all during the course of this special week.

1. Ask your students to share information about their families' culture. If you find out that someone has just moved from another country, ask him/her what life is like there.
2. Ask if any of your students speak another language. Do their parents speak another language? What language? Make a list on your chalkboard of all the languages that represent your classroom. Students at Camelot speak 40 languages.
3. Have your students point on a map or a globe to where in the world their family is from.
4. If any of your students have dressed up for our spirit day to show their culture, have the students talk about what they are wearing in the classroom and what country their outfit represents.
5. Ask your students how they can include someone that doesn't speak English.
6. Ask your students to describe ways we are all different, including from the way we look to our culture.
